

July Feasts Days

In July, we have a number of special days that we celebrate in our Ukrainian-Greek Catholic Church. There are no major feasts this month, but some important ones none the less. There are three important saints for the Ukrainian people celebrated in July: the founder of the monastic life in Ukraine, St. Anthony; and the two people who are responsible for the Byzantine Christian faith coming to Ukraine, Sts. Volodymyr & Olha.



Placing of the Robe of the Mother of God (July 2)

This feast of the placing of the robe of the Mother of God reflects when the robe was found to be in the possession of a family in Blachernae just outside of Nazareth. Many people had come to this house where the robe was and praying through the intercession of the Theotokos for healing. Our Venerable Father Anthony of the Monastery of the Caves in Kiev (July 10)

Anthony of Kyiv, also called Anthony of the Caves (c. 983-1073), was a monk and the founder of the monastic tradition in Kyivan Rus'. Together with Theodosius of Kiev, he co-founded the Kyiv Pechersk Lav-

ra (Kyiv Monastery of the Caves).



Sts. Volodymyr (July 15) & Olha (July 11)

Olha was a regent of Kievan Rus' for her son Sviatoslav from 945 until 960. Following her baptism, Olga took the name Elena. It would be her grandson Vlolodymyr that would convert the entire nation to Christianity, however because of her efforts to spread Christianity through Rus', Olga is venerated as a saint in the Orthodox and Catholic Churches with the epithet "Equal to the Apostles" and her feast day is July 11th. St. Volodymyr also shares this title and is venerated four

St. Elias (July 20)

Elias or Elijah was, according to the Books of Kings in the Hebrew Bible, a prophet and a miracle worker who lived in the northern kingdom of Israel during the reign of King Ahab (9th century BCE). In 1 Kings 18, Elijah defended the worship of the Hebrew God over that of the Canaanite deity Baal. God also performed many miracles through Elijah, including resurrection, bringing fire down from the sky, and entering heaven alive "by fire". It is on this feast that we carry out the custom of blessing vehicles.

UNITY 2021—Stillness in the Chaos






Help Buy Wheelchairs for Children & Adults in Ukraine!

Q & A with Fr. Jay!

Submit your questions to Fr. Jay however you want. Email, text, phone or write to Fr. Jay asking him any of those questions you've been wanting to ask about our faith. Why do we abstain from meat on Fridays? How is incense made? What does a bishop do? What does our Church teach about MAiD?

Question: What is the significance of crossing ourselves?

Answer: The Sign of the Cross is a symbolic gesture which marks the four points of the Cross on which Christ died over one's body. It also represents loving God with all of one's heart, soul, mind and strength. The sign of the cross is most often made at the name of the Holy Trinity, to show reverence for a saint, holy object, or person, at the beginning or end of a prayer, to show humility or agreement, or on numerous other occasions which may vary slightly according to regional/ ethnic practice or personal piety. This is also an outward sign to others of what we profess. This is also why we often wear crosses around our necks.

Question: Why is our Communion different than in the Roman Catholic Church?

Answer: If we go back far enough in history, we will find that both the Eastern Churches and the Western Churches all used leavened bread (such as what we use). At one point, the West (Roman Catholic) migrated to unleavened to be more similar to what Christ would have used at the Last Supper. However, in the Byzantine Empire, unleavened bread was associated with lifelessness, while the leavened was reflective of the Resurrection. As these differences grew in their respective Churches, it eventually became a point of controversy by the year 1054 and is cited as one of the reasons for the Great Schism between the East and the West.

As Catholics, we often receive both forms because of visiting parishes in the Roman Catholic Church. Both are acceptable and neither are any less the Body of Christ once consecrated.
