#### Music to my ears!

Have you ever had a bad day or a day when things are just not going right? Then you're maybe in the car or at work, and you have the radio on or are listening to a playlist somewhere and a certain song starts playing? Have you ever felt almost instantly better after listening to that song or even during the song? I often have this. Not that I have a lot of bad days, but I often experience the power of music and how it can transform our mood.

Throughout my time in Ottawa, I often found myself studying hard or writing papers late into the night at the university library. One of my essentials (other than snacks) was a good playlist to keep me awake and attentive. The same goes for on those long road trips, it's amazing how important music can be to keeping us alert on the road.

In our Church, music has the same power. You'll notice that in the Byzantine/Eastern rite, we sing pretty much everything, except for maybe the Nicene Creed or the prayer for Communion. But our Church sings just about everything else. And there is a reason for that. Used to its full effect, music in church has the ability to bring about spiritual renewal in the listeners. Worship at its heart is a song and is beautiful; therefore the words of Eastern Christian worship cannot be simply said but must be melodiously chanted or sung to express the true nature and purpose of the words.

I encourage all of our parishioners, both young and old, to sing along with our cantors at each service. Sing what you know, and work on learning what you don't know. And if we all sing along in prayer, it will have the power to transform ourselves spiritually as well as others who are listening and praying with us.

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# Catechesis Corner

#### The Nicene Creed: Part 4

The Nicene Creed as we know it, is actually broken into four parts: our belief in God the Father, belief in God the Son, belief in God the Holy Spirit, and belief in the Holy, Catholic Apostolic Church. Even though in our liturgical books it is all one large statement, there are actual sections to it. Today we are going to delve into the final and fourth section, our belief in Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church.
I acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
I look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen

This next part is all about the Church and how we identify it as four important things: one Church, a holy Church, a catholic Church and an apostolic Church.

Believing in *one* Church is important because there is one Body of Christ. That said, there are many parts within the Body of Christ. We believe in diversity within unity. This is beautifully exemplified within the Catholic Church which encompasses the Roman Catholic Church as well as 23 Eastern Catholic Churches, including us!

To believe in a holy Church means the true church will acknowledge the action of the Holy Spirit especially through the seven mysteries/sacraments: Baptism, Chrismation, Confession, Holy Communion, Marriage, Ordination, and Unction/healing.

In the context of the Creed, catholic is a Greek word that means *universal*. In other words every single person is welcome. Full stop. Christ loves each and every person, so as the body of Christ our love and ministry must be totally inclusive.

And lastly, the apostolic Church has two meanings. The church must be led by the descendants of the apostles, and it must retain their faith. The Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and Coptic Orthodox churches all descend from the apostles. An apoostolic faith is also a faith that carries out the mission of the disciples—to spread the good news to the whole world.

On April 24th, in solidarity with the Ukrainian Bishops of Canada invited everyone to join with The Canadian Council of Churches, which was Pascha (Easter Sunday on the Julian calendar), to proclaim together that Christ is Risen, that love overcomes fear, and that life overcomes death and destruction.

All worshipping communities were invited to pray for peace and to ring your church bells at 12 noon as a sign and celebration of hope. Three prayers were made available for communities to pray togeth-

er. One of these prayers are taken from our moleben for peace and is included below. There are also other ways that people may have observed this day of prayer. Although the day has passed, everyone is encouraged to continue to observe any of these practices throughout their daily lives.

O Lord God of powers, and God of our salvation, O God, who alone work wonders:
look down with mercy and compassion on Your humble servants,
and out of love for mankind hearken and have mercy on us and on the land of Ukraine.
Visit Your mercies and compassions upon Your humble servants,
those who defend Ukraine and her much-suffering people,
and hear us who fall down before Your deep compassion.
For You are the health and victory and salvation of them that put their hope in You,
and unto You do we send up glory: to the Father,
and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever,
and unto the ages of ages. Amen.

Ways to practice a day of prayer on a regular basis: Reading Psalm 34(35 Septuagint numbering); praying the Lord's Prayer in the language(s) of our heart; doing justice, loving one another as Christ loves us, and working for peace are central to the mission of God's people in the world; remembering, this day and every day, all who suffer from violence, war and destruction; as we have been blessed, giving generously to the charity of your choice to support the humanitarian response in Ukraine and other areas of conflict in our common home; organizing to assist and welcome the Ukrainians and others who have been uprooted from their communities and are now searching for a new place to call home. *Cnaba Україні! Героям Слава!*
